

Dear Parents, Carers and Friends

Wilds Lodge opened in 2007, so this year we have been celebrating our 10th anniversary. There are still many members of staff who were present when the school opened its doors to the first pupils on a cold and dark winter morning. When we look back, few would have imagined just how much would be achieved in such a short time.

Ofsted inspectors arrived to conduct an inspection in January and concluded that the school continues to be an outstanding provider of both education and care. This was our third consecutive three-yearly education report that was outstanding overall and our seventh consecutive annual social care inspection report that was outstanding! That is a proud and impressive record. The inspectors finished their scrutiny immediately before our anniversary and we felt their visit was a fitting way to mark the end of our first decade as a school.

The most significant development during the last year has been the construction of the new theatre and reception complex. It is an impressive and interesting structure that is causing great interest locally. The builders arrived soon after Sports Day last summer and have been working steadily ever since. It is presently predicted, with some confidence, that it should be completed by the end of November. Many of you have been following its progress through the regular updates on our Facebook page (Wilds Lodge Official). We are very excited about the opportunities it will bring, particularly for music and drama, and look forward to showing you our newest facility.

Although the theatre has been the biggest project, the following pages describe many of our other activities. There is a tremendous energy and enthusiasm within the school and I am often amazed

at the creativity and imagination of the staff. The school is increasingly widely known and has developed an enviable reputation for being active and forward-thinking. Just this

year we have had our accreditation as an approved provider renewed by the National Autistic Society and hopefully, by the time you read this, we should have received both a Nurture Award and the higher quality mark from the Values-based Education Trust (www.valuesbasededucation.com).

The Post 16 facility goes from strength to strength and can be regarded as being fully established now. Although its Ofsted report comes within the fuller Wilds Lodge report, it is inspected and assessed separately to the rest of the school. The Post 16 staff also achieved an 'outstanding' judgement, so they deserve a special mention for their hard work and commitment.

Many of you will be aware that our therapy team has recently been strengthened by the arrival of Natalie Stobbe, who is a fully qualified equine therapist. She has just started working with boys using our horses in the paddocks at Crossroads. Our therapy team is incredibly strong and broad, consisting of Adam (child and adolescent psychotherapist), Abi and Mandy (art psychotherapists), Danni (dance and movement) and now Natalie



too. We are also looking forward to the return of Adele Edwards, who left us three years ago after working on the care team to undertake a doctorate in educational psychology. She comes back in September with many very useful specialist skills to help with the boys' learning in the classroom.

Finally, it is always sad to say goodbye to staff who have been with us for a long time. I have worked with Steve Fox

since January 1987 – a period of thirty long years! He has been responsible for our college links and careers advice for our older boys. Although he has cut the number of days he has worked each week recently, his experience and knowledge will be sorely missed. We wish him a long and happy retirement in Eastbourne.

Mark Robinson joined Wilds Lodge when it opened and has always been our CDT teacher. A formidable and enthusiastic racing cyclist, many Wilds pupils will be forever indebted to him for introducing them to his sport. Within his workshop he has been noted for his patience and kindness. Many boys have sought refuge in his classroom when things have been going wrong for them elsewhere, always being assured of a welcome and some quiet words of reassurance. His calming presence, as well as his abilities to convince even the least confident boy that he has some woodworking skills, will also be greatly missed.

I always imagined that when the theatre was finished the school, as we originally envisaged it, would be complete. I could not have been more wrong! Instead, we are just beginning to realise that instead of finishing a project, we have simply created the most amazing platform from which to launch more exciting developments over the next ten years. I cannot wait to see what happens!

been made, bug houses, bird-tables and hedgehog boxes. These have been placed


around the school and at Ashwell Canal.

they are to shop bought alternatives. In Energy, boys have had lessons about alternative sources of energy. Signs have been made and placed around the school and we took part in Switch off fortnight by turning the heating off. The school has also invested in a Biomass boiler, reducing our oil consumption. In March we took part in waste week. KS2 visited Viridor in Peterborough, where waste is turned into energy. Lessons across all subjects were delivered to boys. At Rock Lodge all food waste is now composted and a new wormery is in place. This will be introduced to the . other two sites soon.





The boys have been taking part in Equine studies at Somerby Equestrian Centre once a week on a Tuesday morning. Each group of boys have taken part in a ten week course which involves, not only riding, but learning the day to day care involved with horses. Each week the boys aim to achieve AQA unit awards and collect evidence to add to their evergrowing portfolios.

Our hope for the future is to develop our own equestrian facilities to continue the equine studies on site, at a much larger scale, with more qualifications becoming available in this area.







Abseil and Climb Everest Challenge Charity Event 2016

On the 24th June a group of boys travelled to the Peak District to abseil down a 90ft Viaduct. The boys and staff were amazing and very brave as they went over the edge of the viaduct twice!

On the 29th of June the boys of Wilds Lodge School climbed 8,840m on a 7.5m climbing wall. This was achieved from 10am till 6pm at night, as the boys endlessly climbed the tower over and over again until the height of the summit of Mt Everest was reached.

Some staff and children did an amazing job climbing over 50 climbs on their own. One staff member achieved 175 climbs and another child reached 75 climbs.

There was an exciting buzz on the day and we saw boys who have never climbed before really try and succeed in ascending the tower.



Team Building

Each class group and their teacher have been involved in team building activities throughout the last term.

Each class were asked to help oneanother in a series of activities, puzzles and challenges.

All the boys engaged really well to

understand the benefits of Together Everyone Achieves More.

Some boys found the puzzles and activities challenging and some found them a breeze but everyone worked together in order to perform as a team whether it was in pairs or as a group.











CRAFT, DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

C raft, Design and Technology belongs to the suite of vocational subjects offered at Wilds Lodge School.

In this subject pupils learn about making items using resistant materials, to appreciate design and to use workshop tools and equipment safely and competently. Creativity figures very highly too as pupils are also encouraged to work on their own ideas.

The qualification chosen introduces simple design ideas, which can be taken forward into a woodworking task. It gives opportunities to gain, practice and develop skills applicable to materials, techniques and processes.

Pupils continue to enjoy the workshop environment and I never fail to be impressed by the hard work and commitment shown. In the last year since the Summer of 2016 15 boys (Post 16, Year 11 and Year 10) have achieved a City and Guilds Level 1 Award in Design and Craft, Woodwork. One pupil made that a double award also in 'Cabinet Making' due to the additional time and effort applied. 3 more Year 10 boys have just this May completed the necessary work to enable a claim for a pass certificate. Numerous boys at KS3 and KS4 have achieved AQA Unit Awards. The photos reflect some of the work these young people have produced. Very impressive I am sure you will agree. Hopefully the interest and enthusiasm will continue.

Going Wild in the Workshop

nother year has flown past and again there has been some great successes and progresses here in the workshop.

We now have a new vehicle for the lads to work on, a convertible Jeep, to help them achieve their qualifications.

We also now have approval to run IMI (the Institute of the Motor Industry) qualifications. IMI are important training providers in the motor vehicle trade and we are privileged to be authorised to be able to deliver some of the qualifications they offer. As well as motor vehicle qualifications, we will now be able to offer Cycle qualifications to the lads.

George and Dylan have completed their Duke of Edinburgh awards, George manufactured a lovely wine rack and Dylan has made a steel rack for the storage container, which will enable us to clear the steel out of the workshop. We will then move the welding benches up against the wall. Dylan has also spent some time practicing TiG welding on both steel and aluminium.

Michael has worked really well, and his motivation/dedication has gained him an AQA Award in making an object in metal, in this case a flower basket of which he was very proud of the outcome.

Henry has made a lovely model of the Typhoon fighter plane his father pilots, he is making another for the school to fasten up on the wall.

He has also completed an aluminium eco bin for the schools use.

Key stage 2 lads, Joe, Logan, Matt, Blake and Cohen now attend on Friday mornings on a rota basis. They are new to this subject and have been introduced to plasma cutting, welding and motor vehicle and will be working towards AQA Awards.

Mark made an aluminium eco bin similar to Henrys, which took him great focus and commitment to create.

Jack absolutely loves spending lots of time here in the workshop and is practicing to becoming a really good quality welder, he has practiced various different weld joints and welding positions, even overhead, which for a lad of his age is quite remarkable. He now is showing interest in motor vehicle and has practiced on wheels and tyres and is capable of balancing the tyre to within 0-0 tolerance which is of a

professional standard.
Jake has manufactured a table



in the CDT workshop and wanted to make the table legs in steel and fully adjustable. This required him using some precise engineering processes like marking out, drilling and tapping.

Josh completed some double curvature work in aluminium and used these skills to make a fantasy gauntlet.

Fred has carried out wheel balancing & welding and is practicing further with these subjects.

Ryan is now on the enterprise team

and is enjoying practicing welding and is making a penny farthing to sell, this will also gain him an AQA Award for his efforts, & a little cash in his pocket.

It has been another successful year, with lots of new introductions to the workshop to help the lads achieve greater and greater projects and now with IMI on board, potentially lots of new qualifications to offer them. I am looking forward to what the lads can achieve in the coming year.

Awareness for Autism



Sensory Garden

Currently on our Crossroads site a Sensory garden is being created. Our garden will provide individual and combined sensory opportunities for our students that they may not normally experience. It will contain scented plants, a water feature, sculptures and textured displays.



Accreditation

Wilds Lodge School was reviewed by the Autism Accreditation in 2016 and achieved the award. The following quotes are from their report:

The Review of Wilds School was excellent the areas of strength highlighted in this report ran through every observation and throughout the school, each observation noted the young men at the school as being confident and engaged, and discussions with the older students mirrored this observation.

The school has a strong pride in their accomplishments, and each of the team were valued for what they bring to the team – this included the efforts of the principle, students and all staff. The School were committed to the development and support of each person, staff and students and this showed clearly within each discussion the review team had.



SENSORY CIRCUITS

At Wilds Lodge School we understand that our children and young people have a range of sensory issues, which may impact on their learning and participation. Our aim is to support child and young persons to achieve and maintain a calm-alert state, enabling them to engage with and achieve their potential in a range of school activities.

Each Child and young person at Wilds Lodge School has access to a range of equipment to meet their sensory needs within classrooms and around the school.

Sensory circuits is a regular programme of specifically designed physical activities which are intended to focus concentration and improve motor skills in readiness for the days learning and interactions. These activities are collectively known as a Sensory Circuit and encourage the development of a child's sensory integration abilities. Over the past year we have implemented these circuits daily for a range of our Key Stage 2 students with the intention over the next 12 months for this to be accessed by students in other key stages.

All of the above activities are undertaken for a set amount of time on each. It is









important that each activity is done in the correct sequence otherwise the outcome is not achieved.

Art and Music

It's been another very good year for Art and Music across the school! Boys have started to take Art outside of the classroom a little bit more this year with a galleries trip for Post 16 and some more outdoor art than ever before. Projects have been important this year and learners across the school have had the chance to create paper flower sculptures or up-cycle old books in response to contemporary pieces. There have been happy accidents, like a beautiful oil mixing pallet that needed to be photographed and focused young artists perfecting their skills and creating wonderful pieces.

Musically, there is a real passion and buzz around the school. Individual music slots are fully booked up and we're preparing so many young musicians to start coming through the ranks of the school and to be able to showcase their abilities. I'm so happy with the progress in the GCSE music boys- the first boys to go for this here! I've been ecstatic with KS2 reading sheet notation and I'm loving that we've gotten some band practises of student musicians happening at lunch and breaks as well as in the evenings at Rock Lodge.

I'm very proud of the progress and excited for how we can push this even further forward next year!


THURSDAY

I would like to wish all the boys and staff the very best of luck in their quest to take the title of best interform Team.








Clay club is run by myself; Mandy Neilson and Abi Thomson and we are Art Psychotherapist in the school therapy department. As keen amateurs of pottery and lovers of the Great Pottery Throw Down we wanted to offer something to the school that wasn't therapy but a creative outlet for all to enjoy and so Clay Club was born. Clay club started in November 2016 and has been running weekly at Tuesday lunch times and has been attended by students and staff in large numbers.

Therapy at Wilds Lodge

Much of the work this year has been about getting to know one another and our different practices as well as creating a structure to our work. Our most recent additions to the team are Nathaly, Sara and the horses and donkeys.

WHAT DO WE DO?

We offer a variety of non-verbal therapies to allow self-expression and understanding through movement, art and animals.

We work hard to create a safe explorative outlet for our

boys whilst maintaining a holistic approach involving our care and teaching staff. Sessions are individual. We offer long term and short-term work depending on the individual needs of the boy.

At present
53 boys receive
therapy from us, over half the school!
Referrals are welcomed and can be
completed by anybody.

Recently we have started to collect formal feedback from staff and boys about the therapy they receive. We are hoping that this not only measures the brilliant work we do but also could potentially help us find ways to improve our work. We have also recently been including written reports for annual reviews.

WORKING WITH FAMILIES

When possible we try to offer support for families as well as the boys we

see. Additionally, Mandy has recently completed a dyadic art therapy course. This is a joined up approach to art therapy involving children and one of their primary care givers. That focuses on the child-caregiver relationship.

We learn all about warming up, cooling down and everything in between! The boys have been fantastic at working together and respecting each other as we learn how to place movements to counts and find our own rhythms.

Mathematics at Wilds Lodge

Last year was highly successful for the maths department in GCSE's. Ollie Wilson achieved the schools first A*; Charlie Shepherd got an A, but was only 2½% off an A* A further 7 students achieved an A-C grade.

2016 saw our first group of boys sit a GCSE in Statistics and Emma will tell you how this went in her report.

Maths encompasses the full range of Key Stages, and we now teach maths from nurture to post 16, Key Stage 1 to Key Stage 5.

have lots of ideas around what we would like to see in the future, from upgraded play equipment to how we would like the next sports day to run. Watch this space to see what we come up with!








Day Boys Camp

HIGHLIGHTS INCLUDED:

- Pupils handling earlier forms of computers and gadgets including typewriters, heavy calculators and earlier mobile phones
- A tour of the first ever computer 'Colossus' which was invented during the last world war to decipher German codes 'Enigma'
- The first ever Laptop computer
- The first ever computerised calculator 'The Witch' used to calculate and build a nuclear power station
- Pupils completing a games programming session
- Examining the first business type computers and discs used



Asdan, Forest Schools and Public services

Over this last year the Post 16 students have had an opportunity to choose from a wide range of subject areas. Within the ASDAN curriculum students have studied different module areas including Number Handling. The students went to Halifax Building Society and heard from the manager about how to read and understand bank statements and how to open up a bank account.

Students have also enjoyed the Forest Schools lessons and learning how to forage, make fires and survive in the open. Team building and confidence skills are developed during these activities.

Some of the students have studied a wide range of Public services lessons where they have examined the different job roles and responsibilities associated with security, especially within prisons. They have also learnt about the different threats associated with terrorism and methods to prevent and tackle the threats.

AQA Health and Well-being and Hospital Visit

Life Skills -Ironing, Shopping and Budgeting

During our autumn term Post 16 students engaged the Life Skills programme and were required to understand a variety of aspects towards individual living. Learning how to iron and do laundry tasks were some of the activities posed, along with learning how to do shopping and understand how to run a home on a weekly budget. The students were introduced to ironing techniques and how to iron safely. Some of them even enjoyed doing it and began to understand why it is important to look tidy and smart.







AQA Work Experience and Visit to Stamford Job Centre

Over this year the Post 16 pupils have studied Education Employability and each student has been required to engage voluntary work experience in the Stamford area. This curriculum has also required students to complete their own CV and thereby input the work they have completed. Students have learnt about the National Insurance number, how to apply for jobs and the completion of job covering letters. Some of the students visited Stamford job centre where the 'Job coach' ,Mrs Joy Cradick spoke to the boys about the process of registering at a job centre, what paperwork is needed, including a CV, National Insurance numbers and having an e-mail account.

We are particularly delighted that our students have successfully completed a

wide range of work placements, including Tyler, Sam, Thomas and

Jack B who have been at Age UK. Sam has recently added to his CV by going to Fine Foods, Andrew had a fabulous period at Waitrose and is now looking towards Morrison's, Jack P is working at Barnardos which goes towards his Duke of Edinburgh's award, Zubair has recently started at Morrison's and Ryan has completed a number of school ICT work related tasks by repairing and rebuilding laptops. Each student are acquiring a Work Experience AQA after completing at least 5 work sessions. Brilliant results, a great year, well done!







Post 16 fire station visit

In May our Post 16 students went along to Oakham fire station to receive a very interesting and informative presentation regarding house fires and first aid in relation to dealing with burns and blood loss. The trip complimented the First Aid training they have received over the last

two terms when the subject of house fires and treating burns was covered. The main message we took away was that all of us must ensure we have a 'smoke detector' fitted and working in our homes. Thanks again to the Oakham fire officers for allowing us at the station!







Newark Air Museum

In May we took Thomas along to Newark Air Museum to see a wide range of military aircraft. We were fortunate to be able to gain access to both the Vulcan bomber and the Shackleton aeroplanes. Thomas thoroughly enjoyed his day as can be seen by the photographs we took . Thomas was really interested in the history and facts associated with these old planes.

Supreme learning at local court

In May this year Thomas from our Post 16 went along to Oakham Castle to take part in a court history drama and learn about how leather Viking jewellery items were made. Mrs Jane Burditt, the castle's education lead provided Thomas with a fantastic input about how the court operated hundreds of years ago and about actual cases heard there. Thomas played a wonderful role as the judge!

Recycling and ecological awareness

Our Post 16 pupils went to two Energy Recovery Facilities this year. The first one was (Viridor) in Peterborough where they received a presentation and guided tour of the control centre. Viridor are the best performing energy companies in the UK and pride themselves in disposing of waste and then creating energy for all domestic properties in Peterborough. 85,000 tonnes of waste is burnt which results in providing 15% of all electricity used in the Peterborough area. The other by-product of this burning includes ash and aggregate, which are used for roads and road building. The only gas by-product is steam, which safely goes into the atmosphere. The pupils thoroughly enjoyed this educational trip which contributes towards the 'Awareness Scheme' Environment module they are studying this term. The photos show the massive claw used to pick-up waste, also Sam and Jack observing operations in the control centre.

Then in April 2017 our Post 16 department visited another Waste to Energy centre in Lincoln. They were provided with a fantastic guided tour of the plant by Sally Hood the Educational Engagement officer based there. Our students were given a good insight into recycling and ecological awareness at the plants educational Centre. They were then given a very good tour of the facility by Sally. All the students thoroughly enjoyed this visit and learnt more about how energy can be produced from waste and the other benefits of this process.

Role play at Oakham Castle


In June our Post 16 students went along to Oakham Castle to learn about some of the history of the castle and about the medieval court.
