
# Remembering Mr Lee

Robin opened Wilds Lodge School in 2007. His determination, passion and dedication to helping young people saw it grow into the school it is today. His ethos and vision created a special, safe place for students helping them achieve their full potential. He not only cared for the pupils but their families and community, often going above and beyond to ensure every child was given an opportunity to learn and thrive.

He was kind, loyal and refused to accept anything but the very best for his students. This was evident through his career as a Head Teacher and Principal, with over 40 years experience and supporting hundreds of pupils and their families. He was rightfully awarded an MBE last year to celebrate his achievements within the SEN education provision.

He worked tirelessly to ensure every child had equality of access, expanding the school to meet the needs of the children who came through his school. The Post 16 provision and later the Nurture provision were testament to this approach, more recently introducing female students to the cohort complimented his inclusive and holistic model.

He will be greatly missed but his memory and vision will continue throughout Wilds Lodge and our amazing students. We are extremely proud to be able to have known and learned from this very special man.








# Egg Hunt
































# FOOTBALL



Back in February, some of the students took part in a running club, and Thomas and Bobby were awarded medals for their efforts! Well done!











Tiling is also another aspect of construction we have learned lots about, we have tiled walls using kitchen and bathroom tiles measuring the wall finding the centre, and placing our tiles so they are symmetrical to the wall we have to tile. Tiling is the most popular section of the Multicraft qualification, we have seen lots of activity in the tiling bays due to this.





Being student-led sessions, students are able to decide which area they prefer to work in.

Louis, is one of our newcomers & has so far carried out motor vehicle tasks & has got to the stage where he will soon be ready to complete his first AQA Award in Wheel Balancing. In metal work, he has been measuring, marking, cutting, welding & has made an ornamental "Moon" heart.

Jordan A has carried out Motor Vehicle tasks. He has been introduced to safely raising the car, removing wheels, wheel balancing & brakes. He



has also been practicing welding too. A very pleasant & polite student, works well & in time I feel he will make a good candidate for the City & Guilds 3902 Motor Vehicle qualification.

Fergus has focused mainly on motor vehicle tasks including balancing, brakes, & transmission, assisting his peers to achieve their qualification.

Finlay M has really shown his aptitude in motor vehicle & has

achieved his AQA Award in wheel balancing. He was comfortable enough to show Lucas the stages for wheel balancing.

Alex has been involved in lots of workshop skills. He is comfortable with most of the tools & equipment here in the workshop. His welding quality is improving & he is now practicing towards City & Guilds standards. He











Jesse has focused on motor vehicle & has removed dismantled/refitted rear suspension, brakes & driveshafts. He is currently reassembling one of the school's vehicles. Jesse, could, with further input, achieve several AQA's & work towards the City & Guilds qualification.

We don't just focus on Motor Vehicle & Engineering, students work with other materials too. Charlie has a passion for the Titanic & has spent some time constructing a lovely model in aluminium & wood & copper. He has also been practicing balancing wheels in readiness for his first AQA Award.

Jordan has also been working on the construction of a model house, using shapes moulded from plaster of Paris.

Bailey has focused well & achieved his first AQA in wheel balancing.

Luke has worked really well & has concentrated on wheel balancing, gaining him his first AQA Award.

Jayden has spent a few lessons in

A dapting to new norms has been a key theme during the last 12 months, and as a team we got our creative heads together to explore how we could work with the challenges the restrictions provided!



Animal therapy has evolved to include working outdoors and in nature, utilising the beautiful green spaces at Wilds Lodge. This has proved hugely successful so far. Our grounds team has been working hard implementing changes and improvements across both sites to make them enriching therapeutic spaces for our students and the animals they work with.

### **TRAINING**

This year the therapy team have been delivering half-termly in house training sessions. The trainings have been open to all staff members across the school and are designed to strengthen teaching and care staff knowledge on a range of topics related to mental health and wellbeing.

The team also attended a group animation training in June. We loved it and are excited to be able to incorporate the new skills we've learned into therapy at Wilds Lodge.

### **COVID WORKSHOPS**

Following on from the Covid Creative Art Packs sent home during the first lockdown, the team have continued to encourage students to engage creatively to think about their experiences of the pandemic.

In February, as part of Children's Mental Health Week and the theme of "express yourself", we thought it would be great to get our pupils thinking and talking about the music they listen to, particularly throughout the Pandemic, and create a Wilds Lodge Pandemic Playlist!

Staff and pupils added 40 songs that they had been listening to. Songs that cheer us up, lift us up and give us some hope for a pandemic-free future!











### Peg Doll Workshop-Nurture

Our nurture group attended this workshop involving a story about giants, kings and a tailor. The students listened to the story and played games involving moving and acting to help bring the story to life. The students each made a peg doll of a character to take away with them.

KS3 listened to the Lykke Li song Lyrics for "Dance Dance Dance".

" Having trouble telling how I feel But I can dance, dance, dance Couldn't possibly tell you how I mean But I can dance, dance, dance".

The song is all about words not always being easy and finding other ways to express yourself. This is what creative therapies are all about. The students listened to a soundtrack with a range of genres and used paint to move and express themselves as they listened to the music.

### Hydro Dip Mask Workshop- KS4

Often in therapy we work with the idea of not knowing. Uncertainty can be really frustrating, anxiety provoking and can often leave us feeling uncomfortable. KS4 played with the idea of not knowing through experimentation in their hydro dip mask workshop. Each student chose coloured spray paints



which they sprayed on the surface of large containers of water. They then dipped their masks in and pulled them out to see what effects they had made.

# Nature based drumming workshop- KS5

Rhythm is within us and all around us; from our hearts beating, the way we move and talk, to what we hear and see in nature. In many cultures, being together in a circle has been an integral part of community life, to share experiences and celebrate, and music plays a big part in that.

The KS5 students got a taste of a music and nature based therapeutic activity, sharing space with the horses at crossroads. Through a drumming circle, pupils engaged in a shared rhythmic experience which created a sense of connection and fun.

### Class workshops

As well as this the therapy team organised creative activities for the students to complete with their class teachers.

### Feeling Jars

Making a feeling jar is a creative way of representing your feelings. This activity can increase emotional literacy and the ability to



recognise feelings. It promotes right brain/ left brain activity and encourages reflection & re-evaluation about feelings.

### Character workshops

This workshop involved creating a character. Students were provided with peg dolls and worksheets that were designed to develop a character. The students were then able to bring their character to life by decorating their peg dolls. We often work with characters and puppets in therapy as a way of helping children project their thoughts and feelings onto characters. Working in this way allows the child to explore difficult feelings about themselves at a safe distance.

# Bowl of light (clay bowl making)

Therapeutic stories are used to help children process different themes and emotions through metaphor. The characters and events can subtly mirror real life themes for the child to draw out comparisons or emotional experiences between themselves and the characters featured. Alongside this we often use clay in therapy to help our students express their feelings and emotions physically in a safe contained space.

# CDI

This year CDT has had another exciting year with lots of learning taking place with projects being developed and produced to a very high standard.

Pupils from Key stage 3 have been extremely busy making sweet dispensers which were fun to make and great to test the proof of the concept! The individual sections of the sweet dispensers had to be measured and cut out from bigger pieces of wood before pre drilling holes and joining them together with screws. To hold the sweets we had jam jars turned upside down and fixed into place directly on top of a drilled out hole for the sweets to drop into. The sweets are now in the sliding wooden server which can be pulled out and the sweets can be eaten!! Fantastic!!!!

We have seen Toby's imagination for a project go from strength to strength. He has made his name using copper pipe soldering them all together in perfect size so they all look uniformed, each letter has also been polished to give an ultra gloss finish.

At Christmas time Toby made some miniature figures, he made a snowman and a Father Christmas both with such an amazing attention to detail giving them a professional finish. After his success with the Christmas figures Toby made a caricature figure of a robin he added flames to the tail to turn it into a rocket Robin!

Other things Toby has made include a hanging coat hook with a shelf for keys and nic nacs, he has also completed probably his biggest task so far which is an ergonomic chair. We sat Toby down so we could measure and calculate the height of the seat and the curvature too. There was lots of time and determination spent in making the chair but what a fabulous end result one which Toby should be very pleased about, well done Toby!

Traditional wooden games have been a hit again this year. We have been making O's and X's games, Finlay has made a flick ball game based on the pinball principle.

Travelling was a topic for one

half term where we had a choice of transportation methods and we had to design and build that vehicle. We had some building cars with axles and moving wheels that sped across the workshop floor! We also had a selection of boats from sailing boats to punts with paddles.

All in all its been another fantastic year in the CDT workshop, well done to everyone for all the hard work and dedication.















# **MUSIC**

This year has seen the start of a functioning KS3 rock band. This has formed from individual music lessons and I'm so pleased to see the young musicians branching out and looking to form something for themselves. This band features two guitarists, a bassist, piano player and a drummer. They practise at least once a week now and are starting to get quite good! So watch this space, when they're ready I'd very much like to record something to share with you all.

Individual music lessons are at peak demand, more so than ever. I'm teaching guitar, bass, piano, drums, singing, composition, audio engineering and I've even had a little bit of trumpet- all in lunches and break times. This has produced an interesting dilemma because as more kids have heard the results they also want to participate. So now there is a fantastic buzz for music in the school, but I have to work out how to reach all of the eager children.

Despite all of the difficulties of the last year, academically the children have been doing very well. My GCSE students have still managed to record solo and ensemble performances and compose their own original songs. In KS3 students have studied topics ranging from folk music, medieval music, Serbian kolo's, Jazz improvisation, film music and Latin music. I've also made a considerable effort to




really introduce reading music from a stave in KS2 and I'm so happy to see 5 year old's correctly reading notes.
